



Malcolm de Chazal tribute exhibition Beachcomber Resorts & Hotels champions Mauritian art on the international stage

Beachcomber Resorts & Hotels is proud to support the upcoming exhibition honouring Malcolm de Chazal, a pillar of Mauritian art, at the Halle Saint Pierre in Paris, starting on September 10th. This event will feature 200 of the artist's works, offering an exceptional showcase of his creative genius. In view of this exhibition, Beachcomber is lending a selection of its own original Chazal masterpieces, joining the Blue Penny Museum, the MCB Group, and Didus Art as the event's partners.

Beachcomber's roots are deeply Mauritian. As a proud ambassador of the island, the group is constantly endeavouring to preserve and promote its rich cultural heritage. Karine Perrier-Curé, Chief Brand and Communication Officer at Beachcomber Resorts & Hotels states: "We believe that beauty is cultivated in all its dimensions, and this exhibition is a perfect illustration of our commitment to Mauritian art and culture".

Malcolm de Chazal stands as one of the most influential Mauritian artists of the 20th century. His work as both poet and painter earned acclaim from leading post-war literary and artistic luminaries, such as André Breton, George Bataille, Jean Paulhan, and Francis Ponge. Léopold Sédar Senghor, the renowned poet, writer, and first president of Senegal, also recognised the distinctive nature of Chazal's work.

The Blue Penny Museum found a kindred spirit in the Halle Saint Pierre, Montmartre's museum of Art Brut and outsider art, to introduce Chazal to a French audience already captivated by his writings. This exhibition pays homage to Chazal's versatility, highlighting not only his literary prowess across genres but also his artistic endeavours from 1956 onwards.

The exhibition goes beyond a mere retrospective. It will be complemented by the release of a never-beforepublished work from Allia editions, along with conferences and a comprehensive 200-page catalogue. On Saturday, October 5, 2024, the Halle Saint Pierre will host a special day dedicated to Malcolm de Chazal, featuring talks, panel discussions, and a curated selection of works by Indian Ocean writers and poets. The discussions will explore Chazal's connections to surrealism and delve into the many facets of his creativity, from aphorisms to mythical narratives, and from creolisation to political engagement.

Echoing the Parisian event, the Blue Penny Museum will present an exhibition of Malcolm de Chazal's paintings in Port Louis in February 2025, offering Mauritians and visitors the opportunity to discover or rediscover the work of this emblematic Mauritian figure.



1763:	Arrival of François de Chazal
	de la Genesté in Mauritius, ancestor
	of Malcolm de Chazal.
1902:	Birth of Malcolm de Chazal in Cockerney,
	Vacoas, Mauritius.
1902-15:	Childhood in Allée Brillant and Mesnil
	aux Roses, then Forest-Side.
1914:	Secondary education, Royal Curepipe
	College.
1919:	Leaves for the United States with his
	brother Lucien. Studies in Baton Rouge,
	Louisiana.
1924:	Diploma in agricultural engineering. He
	works for a few months in Cuba, then
	visits France, England and Switzerland.
1925:	Permanently returns to Mauritius;
	first job in the sugar industry.
1930:	In disagreement with his bosses, he
	turned to the aloe fibre industry.
1935:	Publication of Une synthèse objective de
	la crise actuelle, followed by Nouvel essai
	d'économie politique, in which his
	criticisms shine through.
1937:	Malcolm de Chazal joins the public
	service, at the Electric & Telephone
	Department.
1940-1944:	Publication of the first volume of
	Pensées, followed by Pensées II à VI.
1945:	Publication of Sens-plastique
	in Mauritius.
1946:	Secretary General of the Société
	des Écrivains Mauriciens.
1947:	Publication of Sens-plastique
	in Paris by Gallimard.
1950:	Malcolm de Chazal starts writing plays.
1951:	Publication of Petrusmok.
1956:	Malcolm de Chazal retires
	from the administration.
1957:	Publication of Sens Magigue.

1958:	He begins to paint and divides his time
	between painting and writing.
1959:	Malcolm de Chazal joins the Labour
	Party as a candidate in Rose Hill in
	favour of autonomy.
1962:	He burns around a hundred canvases on
	the beach at Le Chaland.
